

JENEISHA HARRIS

Activist. Writer, author, community and nonprofit organizer, Memphis native and self-proclaimed rebel. Harris is the Free Community Food Program founder and program director, the founder of the Barbara J. Harris Scholarship Fund and the author of "Black Girl, Cry." With two arrests and an unjustified warrant targeting

her activism around the removal of the bust of Nathan Bedford Forrest's statue, the State of Tennessee has attempted to silence her voice and work. In spite of this, she perseveres in the name of inherited resilience by continuing community work efforts, feeding hundreds of children every summer with the Free Community Food Program, empowering Black women through literature and sisterhood through The Girlfriends Book Club and organizing communities with black nonprofits in Nashville, TN. From civil disobedience to mutual aid, her bones bleed rebellion, Blackness and all things community. And in the words of our beloved Audre Lorde, "She is deliberate and afraid of nothing."



ANITRA L. HAMILTON

A proud alumnus of West Virginia University, where she received a Bachelor of Arts in Psychology, a Bachelor of Arts in Biology and a Bachelor of Science in Nursing. She currently resides in Morgantown, WV, and is employed with WVU Hospitals Ruby Memorial where she has worked for 17 years on the Advance Certified Orthopedic Unit. Hamilton is the current president of the Morgantown-Kingwood Branch of the NAACP, which hosts quarterly blood drives and Narcan trainings, in addition to vaccination clinics. The branch also has helped to create a coalition of organizations to promote voter registration, voter

engagement and poll attendance. She is a proud member of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority Incorporated, Gamma Chi Omega chapter, sits on the Council for Gender Equity of WVU and was appointed to the West Virginia House of Delegates, representing the 81st District, which covers a portion of Morgantown.
